New Findings: Justice System

Over 3200 people in prison in England & Wales are veterans - almost 5% of the recorded Census prison population*.


Nearly three-quarters of prisons have at least one veteran.

Census England & Wales captures those people in prison, detention centres or approved bail and probation premises who had been sentenced to 12 months or longer at these establishments, were awaiting sentencing, or had no other address or person to complete the Census at another address



A larger percentage of veterans than non-veterans aged 25-74 are in prison (the biggest differences, ages 25-39).


Residents aged 16 years and over in prisons, detention centres and approved premises for bail and probation, by age groups



General Population Comparisons

For the first time, Census data lets us compare veterans' health and disability with the non-veteran population using adjusted figures.

211,850 (11.4%) veterans in England & Wales reported bad or very bad health. General Health is in line with the wider population when adjusted for age, gender, and location.



This kind of insight helps us, and others, shape services that really meet the health and disability needs of our Armed Forces community.



Data Gaps & Future Priorities

The 2021 Census has been vital in mapping what we know about the Armed Forces community - especially when combined with other robust data, such as Ministry of Defence statistics.


Cross-referencing these revealed key gaps, like limited data on finances. This process didn't just show what we knew - it also highlighted what we didn't.

This method helped us build a **targeted list of high-priority questions** we still need answers
to, **shaping both our research priorities and overall strategy.** Finances - alongside
other critical areas - have emerged as a key



We commissioned **YouGov** to undertake a survey of 3000+ members of the Armed Forces **Community** across the UK, to understand their experiences and views of issues they face, RBL, and our future direction. Respondents were:

Policy Development

Our policy team uses robust research and data to understand the key issues facing the Armed Forces community and **shape national policy** and **services.**

The 2021 Census has been vital in giving us a clear picture of veterans, their families and their needs. This, combined with other evidence, underpins a strong policy programme and manifesto for the next Government.

Our manifesto sets out a wide range of practical, evidence-based ideas to significantly improve the lives of the Armed Forces community. These include improving healthcare access, reducing homelessness, and supporting veterans in the criminal justice system – helping ensure those in the AFC receive the tailored support and fair treatment they are entitled to.
