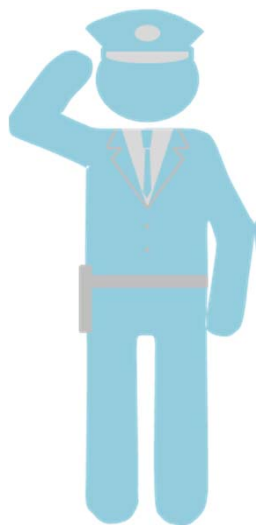



<p>► Who takes part in the survey?</p>	 <p>around 5,600 adults (aged 16 & over)</p>	 <p>In private households (incl rented accomodation)</p>	 <p>Across Scotland</p>
<p>► Who does not take part in the survey</p>	 <p>Children</p>	 <p>Those living in group, residences, institutions or those without a fixed address</p>	 <p>Commercial or public sector bodies</p>

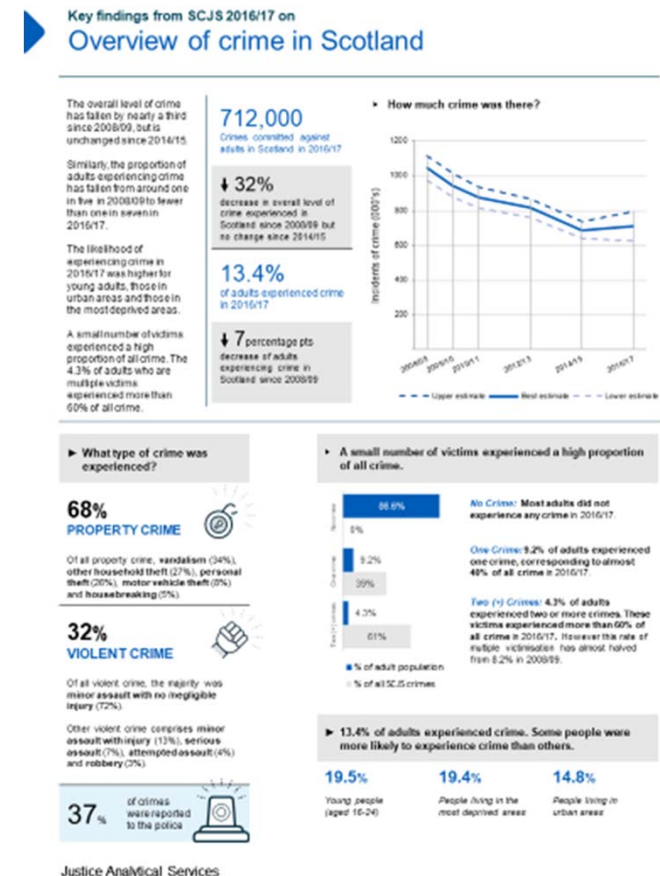
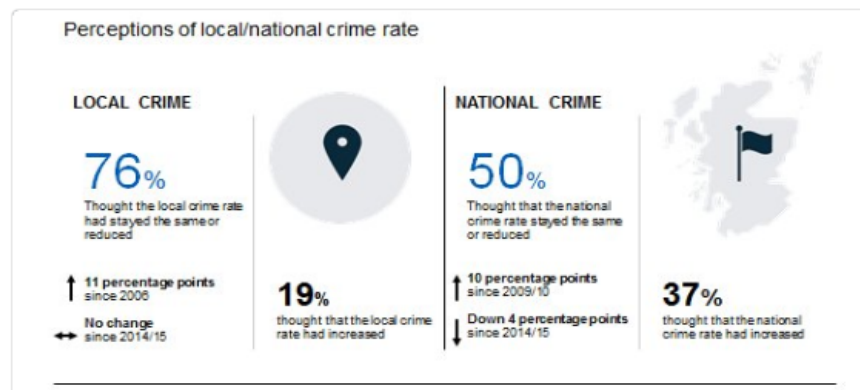

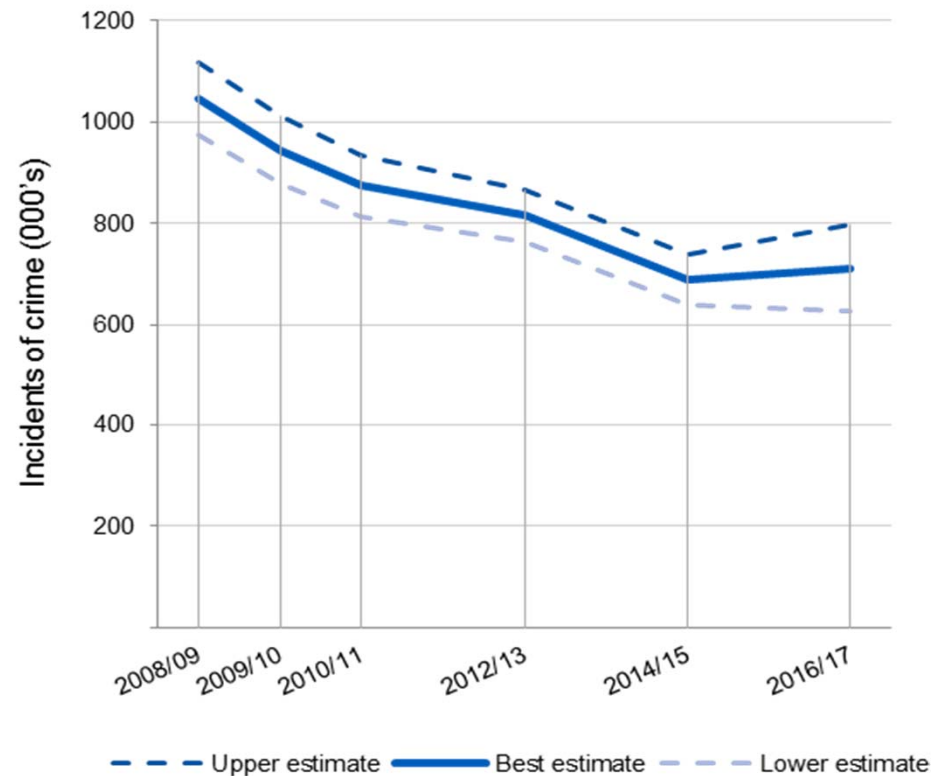
How much crime was there?

712,000

Crimes committed against adults in Scotland in 2016/17

↓ 32%

decrease in overall level of crime experienced in Scotland since 2008/09 but no change since 2014/15

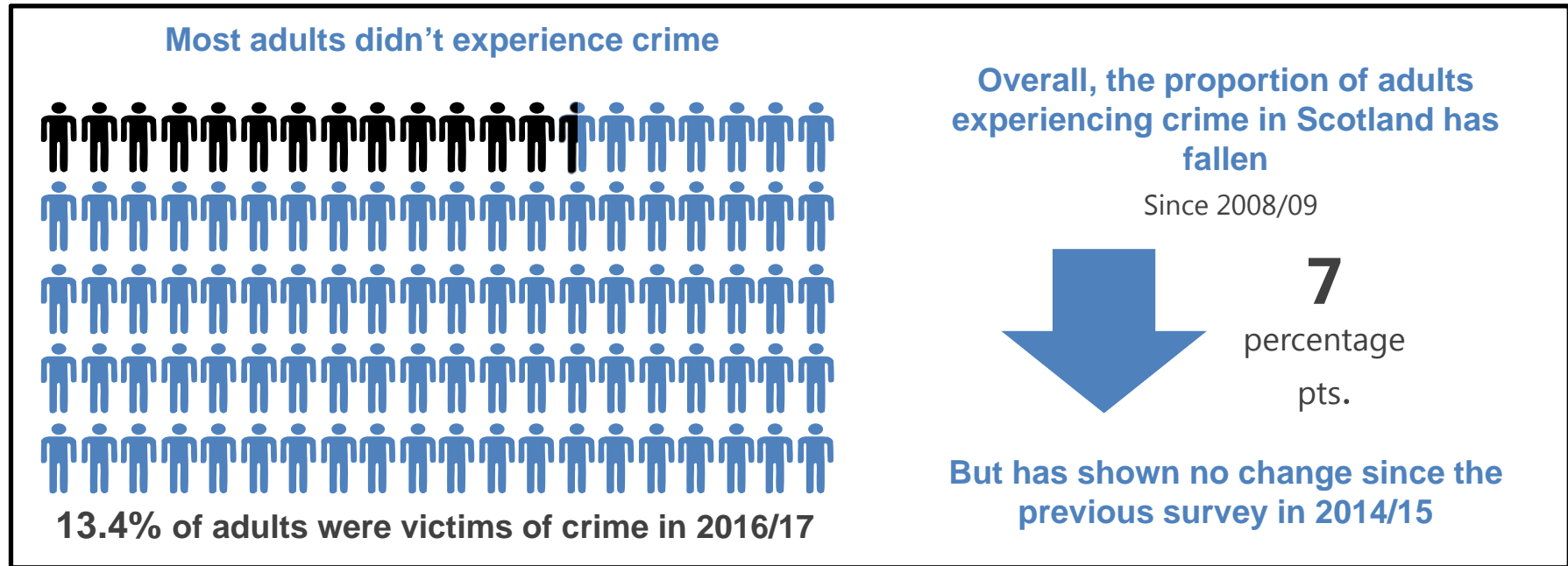

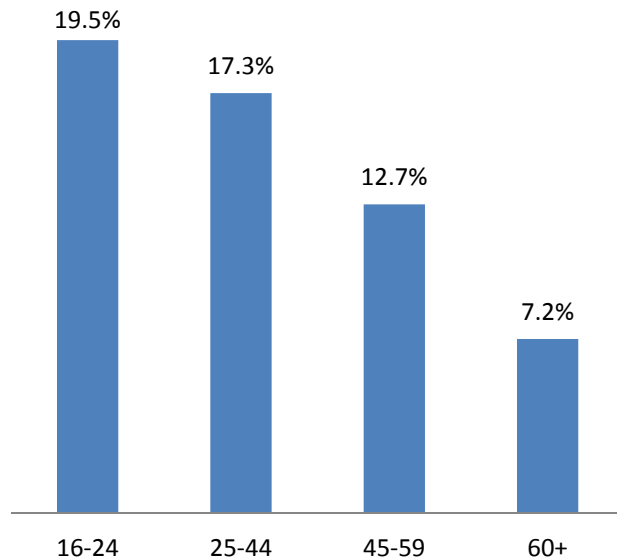

The likelihood of being a victim of crime has fallen

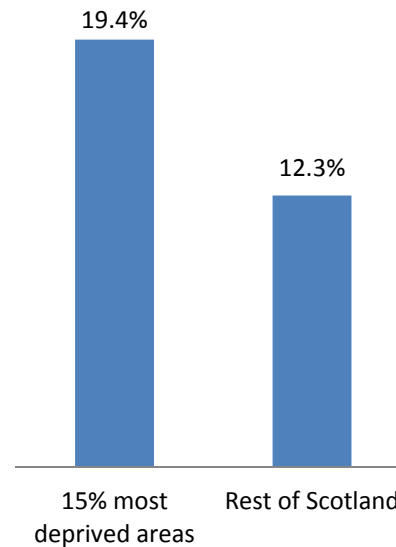


- 11.5% of adults were victims of **property crime**
(down from 18.0% in 08/09 and 13.0% in 14/15)
- 2.9% of adults were victims of **violent crime**
(down from 4.1% in 08/09; no change since 14/15)

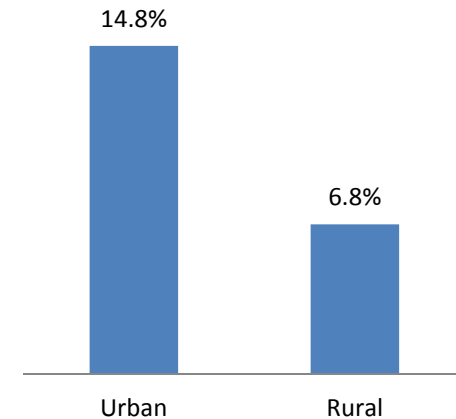
Some people were more likely to experience crime



Young adults were more likely to experience crime.



More adults living in the most deprived areas were victims of crime



More adults living in urban areas were victims of crime.

How did experiences of violent crime vary amongst the population?

► 2.9% of adults experienced violent crime. Some people were more likely to experience this than others.

Notable trends since 2008/09:

- the proportion of **16-24 year olds** experiencing violent crime has more than halved - falling from 12.0% to 5.3%. Prevalence rates for all other age groups have shown no significant change over this period.
- the prevalence rate for adults living in the **15% most deprived areas** has not shown any significant change since 2008/09, whereas the rate has reduced for those living in the rest of Scotland (from 3.8% to 2.5%).

Multiple and Repeat Victimisation

A small proportion of people experienced a high proportion of property and violent crime.

ALL	9.2% of adults experienced one crime	4.3% of adults experienced >1 crime (61% of all crime)
PROPERTY CRIME	8.3% of adults experienced one property crime	3.3% of adults experienced > 1 (53% of property crime)
VIOLENT CRIME	1.8% of adults experienced one violent crime	1.1% of adults experienced > 1 (66% of violent crime)

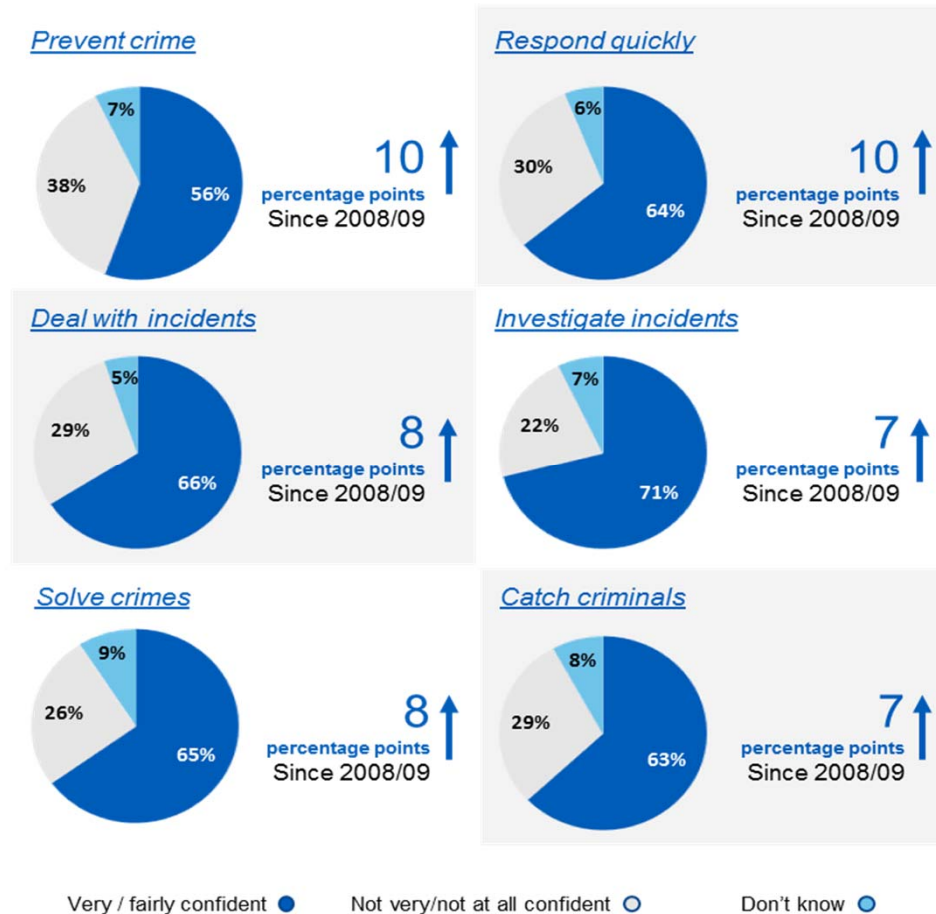

Confidence in the police

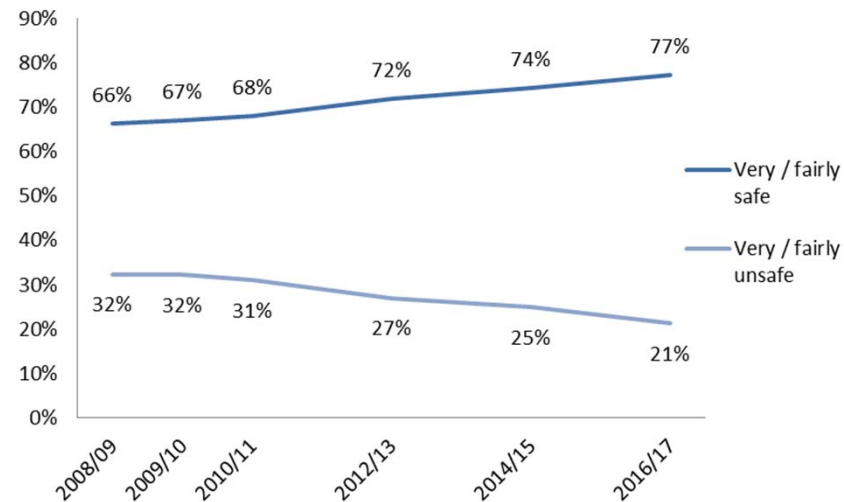
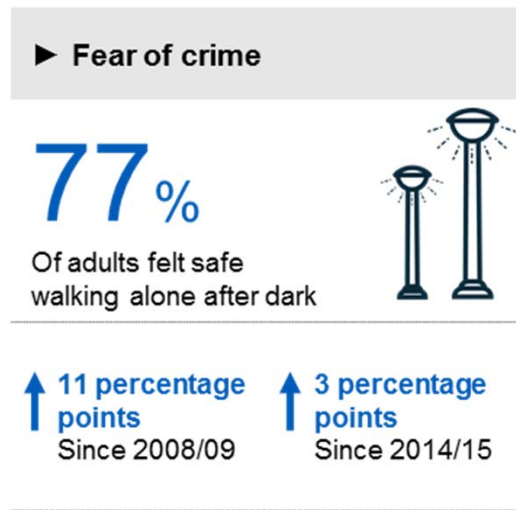
People are generally confident in the police to undertake specific aspects of policing ...and confidence has risen across all measures since 2008/09.



The majority of adults in Scotland (58%) believed the police in their local area were doing an **excellent or good job** in 2016/17 (unchanged since 2014/15 but down from 61% in 2012/13)

Fear of crime

People are feeling safer in their communities:



But some groups were relatively less likely to feel safe in 2016/17:

- Victims of crime (70%)
- People in most deprived areas (63%)
- Females (67%), compared to males (89%)

 - Plus Police Division data tables – 2016/17 & 2017/18 data

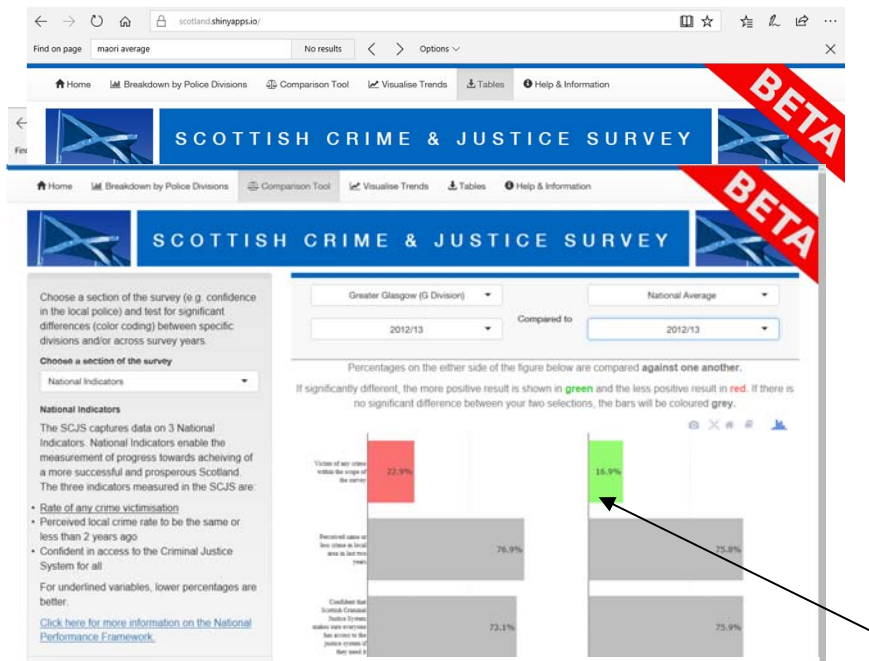

Interactive Rshiny app

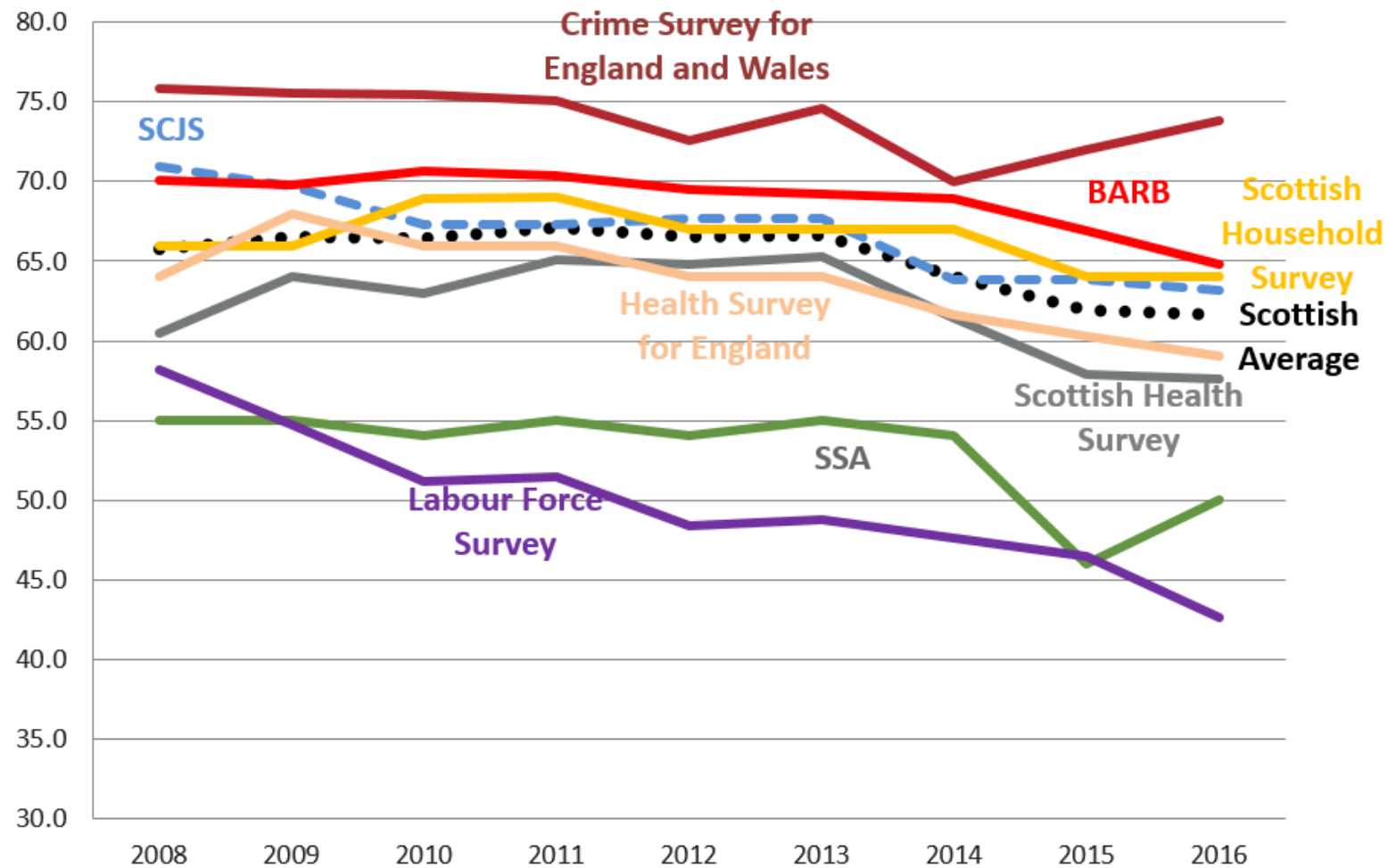


- Easy to update
- Interactive, variety of different visualisations
- Option for customised tables
- In-built significance testing of proportions

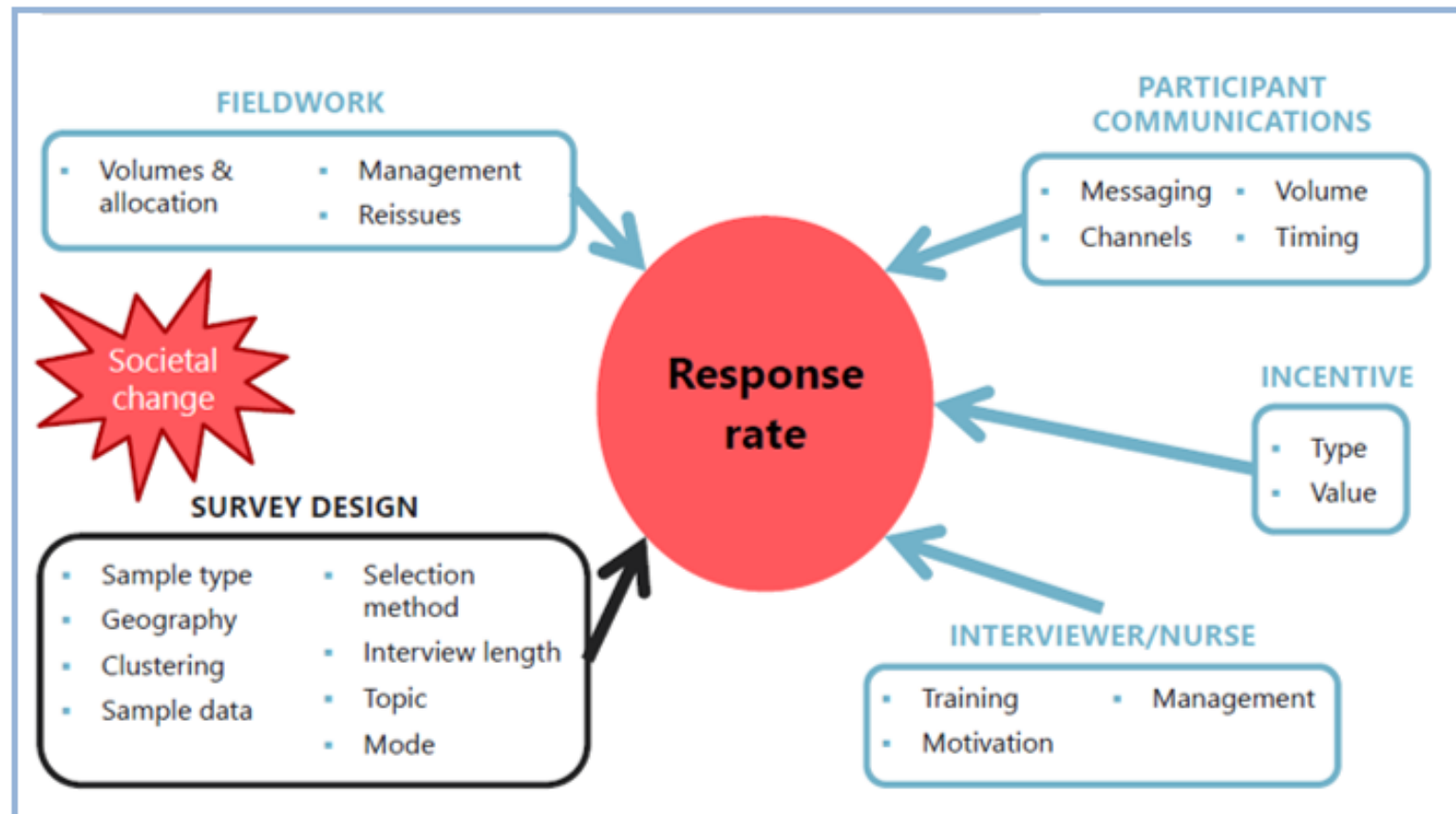
SCJS Questionnaire Development

- Survey is currently at capacity and has included largely same content over the years
 - Increasing demand to cover more topics
 - Developing a more flexible and responsive SCJS
 - Also important to ensure existing questions are relevant and up to date
- Likely priorities for review over next year or so
 - Partner abuse
 - Policing
 - Historical child abuse
(Cyber crime)
(Offending behaviour)
- Engagement with users (some compromises likely) are key elements

SG response

- **Workshop with contractors, UK crime survey leads, survey methodologists**
 - Considered background, issues, existing empirical evidence and range of options for change
- **Prioritising options for change**
 - No change means likely continued non delivery of N (6,000 interviews) and response rate (68%)
 - Change would deliver higher N and lower response rate
 - So looking at impact on range of results of reducing response rate
 - in SHS and SCJS
 - And testing effect of respondent incentives

Analysis

- **Continuing to improve our analysis to focus on victims**
 - Focus on Violent Crime
 - Repeat and multiple victimisation
 - Types of victim
 - Impact / harm
 - Risk factors / drivers
- **Enhancing use of the survey data**
 - Over time
 - Multi-year pooled data set (2008/09 to 2016/17) – developing and using
 - Across survey sections (main survey and self-completion, attitudinal modules e.g. policing)
