

What is the UK Data Service?


- Long-term access to high quality Social Science data since 1967.
- Funded by the UKRI and ESRC.
- Comprehensive learning resources, support, training, and guidance.
- Experts in Safe Research.
- · Data curation, digital preservation, data access and user support.
- A data impact blog showcasing the impact of our research.

Quick facts about the UK Data Service

- The UK Data Archive was established in 1967, it then became the UK Data Service in 2012.
- The previous name for the UK Data Service was The Social Science Research Council Data Bank.
- The UK Data Archive operates from the University of Essex however the UK Data Service is made up of the archive and partners from The University of Manchester, University College London, The University of Edinburgh and JISC.
- We have over 9,200 datasets in our collection, which is ever expanding.
- The most downloaded dataset is 6614, coming from study Understanding Society.



What is secondary analysis and why do it?

- Data is collected in many ways: surveys, interviews, administrative records, business records, and censuses.
- Primary collection can be time-consuming, expensive, and requires expertise.
- Re-analysis of existing data that has already been collected.
- Usually free, large range of sources, representative, robust, and transparent.



- · Individual researchers.








Survey Microdata

Anonymised individual or household level data.

- Large sample sizes.
- Nationally-representative.
- SPSS, Stata, or R.
- Flexible.



Key data: Cross-sectional surveys

- Crime Survey for England and Wales (1982-)
 - Information about levels of crime, public attitudes to crime, and other related issues.
 - Asks people about crimes they have experienced in the last year.
 - An important alternative to police records.
- British Social Attitudes Survey (1983 -)
 - Runs annually.
 - Measure of public views on a range of topics such as work, equalities, welfare, health, and how the country is run.

Longitudinal data: Panel and cohort data

• Similar to cross-sectional survey - large, nationally representative studies.

 One key difference – it follows the same individuals or households over time.

Change at individual level over time.

- Two main types panel and cohort.
- Example- Understanding Society



Cross-national surveys

- Allow comparisons across different countries.
- Topics include education and income, working conditions, poverty.


Examples in our catalogue include:

International Macrodata

- Time series data aggregated to country/region.
- Regularly updated.
- International governmental organisations.
- Various access conditions.
- Databanks cover many different topics.


- Hosts hundreds of economic and social datasets provided by the World Bank, OECD, International Monetary Fund, United Nations, and International Energy Agency.
- View by data provider.
- Extract the information you require.
- User guides and video tutorials available <u>Accessing, exploring and visualising international data</u>.

UK Census Data

- Census 2021 was released in July 2022 designed to be 'digital first' (75% of population completed online questionnaire.
- First to include sexual orientation and gender identity questions.
- Used as baseline for other statistics. Different data have different access requirements.
- There are 4 kinds of census data available from the UKDS:
 - Aggregate.
 - Boundary.
 - Flow.
 - · Microdata.

- You can subset data from the 2001 and 2011 censuses (England, Wales, Scotland, Northern Ireland) from InFuse.

Qualitative/Mixed Methods

• Non-numeric information, such as interview transcripts, diaries, anthropological field notes, answers to open-ended survey questions, audiovisual recordings, and images.

Can be searched in the catalogue or accessed through <u>QualiBank</u>.







Survey data




International data

Our international macrodata contain socioeconomic time series data aggregated to a country or regional level for a range of countries over a substantial time period.


Qualitative data

Qualitative research gives a voice to the lived experience, offering researchers a deeper insight into a topic or individuals' experiences. Qualitative data can be combined with quantitative to enhance understanding around a policy or topic in a way that quantitative data by itself often cannot.






