






Lessons learned

- Incentives are now there: ADR UK is about meeting government priorities for analysis and evidence
- Structural issues resolved: Fewer organisations involved and strengthened role for ONS as the data infrastructure hub - key to gaining public trust and acceptability
- Governance much tighter: will mean a better experience for government and researchers
- 'Create and destroy' does not work: need to invest in curated datasets designed to meet research priorities

What do the public think?




- There is support for the use of linked admin data when there is social value/public benefit
- Tend to think that data is already linked and shared across government
- Happy for data to be linked and shared as long as the necessary protections are in place and data cannot be re-identified





Why are things different now?

- The Digital Economy Act, supported by governance bodies (ethics, public good)
- A UK-wide government-backed network of funded secure research services
- Advocates within government and related organisations
- A body of supportive evidence from public engagement activities









So - why does replication matter?
