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# Census Data

- Census Act 1800. Enabled the first census on 1801
- Until 1831 the census is a head count of everyone in the country on a given day.
- Nowadays it is defined as the “count of all people and households”, incorporating gradually more information of the population

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# A brief description of census

- What is census?
  - Main function to count the population at one or more location
  - Obtain some characteristics about the population
  - Outputs at small geographies
- What is it for?
  - Informs public spending
  - Used as a basis for other statistical systems
  - Inform the public policy making process
  - Used by Central and Local Governments
  - Used by NGOs
  - Used for research purposes (to inform public policy too)

## 1. Supported by the UK Data Service

- **Microdata**
  - Anonymised samples of census records
  - Detail limited to protect confidentiality
- Aggregated data
  - Counts of combinations of characteristics for areas
- Flow data
  - Counts of migrants from origin to destination
  - Or, between first and second address
  - Or home and place of work
- Boundary data
  - Geographical Information System (GIS) formats.
  - Shape files to enable these to be mapped

## 2. Supported by CALLS

- Longitudinal microdata for each country

- **Public release**

- Standard tables, available through the [Census Data Explorer](#) or the [data warehouse](#)
- Commissioned and Additional tables\*,
- Teaching microdata sample (1%), available

- **Safeguarded release**

- Safeguarded tables provided directly by NRS to a data user under Data Sharing Agreement\*

- **Secure release**

- Custom census microdata (including data linkage projects)
  - available through eDRIS to access in a Safe Setting, by Approved Researchers under a Data Sharing Agreement with NRS.

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# Types of 2011 census microdata

- Being released by each census office separately
- Open files
  - Teaching files – available from census offices (1% regional taster file)
- Safeguarded
  - regional files(5%)
  - grouped local files (5%)
- Controlled access
  - Individual files (10%) England and Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland
  - Household files (10%) England and Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland

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# What can be done? (1)

- Can create your own tables.
- Combination of characteristics (variables) not available on ready-made released tables.
- Can define subpopulation for underrepresented groups
  - Due to the large sample size
- Can create regional and local authorities aggregated variables
  - Enhancing area level estimates
  - Relatively large samples for small areas
- Can complement survey data
  - With area level characteristics added



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## What can be done? (2)

- Allows to undertake several type of statistical analysis
- Allows to visualise and analyse change and trends over the years
  - Putting area level characteristics into maps
- **Trade-off**
  - Sample data, means that results are estimates
  - Geographical detail is limited in safeguarded data

# Multicultural nationalism? National identities among minority groups in Scotland's census. (Ross Bond, 2016)

**Aim:** To compare the national identities of those belonging to various minority groups in the UK.

**Data:** 5% microdata sample of census 2011 for Scotland and England and Wales.

**Key variable:** National Identity

## **Main findings:**

- In each nation the proportion of White majority identify as Scottish, English or Welsh is higher than those who identify as British.

- The levels of sub-state identification are clearly higher in Scotland than in the other nations.

- Non-white minorities in Scotland are much more likely to identify with the sub-state nation (Scottish) than their counterparts in the other nations.

- To some extent, Scottish national identity is relatively inclusive of minorities.

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## Is informal caregiving independently associated with poor health? A population-based study. (Legg, L et al. 2013)

**Aim:** To analyse the relationship between informal caregiving and poor health.

**Data:** UK 2001 Census (Individual Licenced Sample of Anonymised Records I-SAR)

**Key variable:** self-reported health status and provision of informal care.

### **Main findings:**

- People who report providing informal care have an increased risk of reporting poor health compared with those who do not provide informal care.

- Among those, health status was worse for those providing the highest number of hours unpaid care.

- Caregivers may be exposed to physical or psychosocial stressors that may contribute to physical and mental health problems.

  - Available in spreadsheet format (csv files) from census offices: [ONS](#), [NRS](#) and [NISRA](#).
  - Also available as SPSS/Stata/Nesstar format from the [UK Data Service](#) ***without registration***
- Safeguarded microdata: From 1961 to 2011, available from the [UK Data Service](#), ***requires online registration***
- Controlled- Secure data ***via census offices only***: [ONS](#), [NRS](#) and [NISRA](#).

## Census microdata

SHARE

We provide access to cross-sectional census microdata, these are anonymised individual level records sampled from a single census. They are large individual level files which resemble the sort of data that might be collected directly from a questionnaire. Because individual records contain a wide range of individual and household characteristics, the data enable multivariate analyses for a wide range of purposes.



The UK Data Service holds contemporary data from the 1981 to 2011 Censuses and microdata samples from 1961 onwards are planned.
