I: Can I have your full name please?

FW: Frank Woolley.

I : And your present address?

FW: 34 Speedwell Street, Longton.

I : And are you married?

FW: Yes.

I: And the year of you marriage?

FW: 1930.

I: The year you were born?

FW: 1902.

I: And where were you born?

FW: Ashfield Road, Longton.

I: Can you remember how many years you lived in Edgefield Road in the house where you were born?

FW: No, I'm afraid not.

I: Can you remember if you stayed in that house until 1918 or were there any moves in between?

FW: Oh there's moves in between.

I: Can you remember where you moved to from Edgefield Road?

FW: The first address I can remember living in is number 8 Heathcote Street, as I can remember living in. So I must have been a baby when I left Edgefield Road.

I : So you can't have lived there very long at all?

FW: No. And then the next address is Melvin Street.

I: Can you remember how long you were there?

FW: Oh I should be there 'til I'm about nine I should imagine, eight or nine.

I: And then where did you move to?

FW: 57 Speedwell Street. And that's - that's where I stayed 'til I was married.

I : Do you remember why the family made all these moves?

FW: Oh well in them days they used to do, families could go anywhere. There was always houses empty you know.

I: Do you know why this was?

FW: Well - I couldn't say really. 'Cos I can remember in this row here, three or four houses empty at a time.




# Finding Data: Key Data

Data and resources grouped by topic




# Finding Data: Data catalogue

Data catalogue allows users to find and browse data, guides, case studies, and publications

Enter a keyword, survey name or study number and search our data or website

Data catalogue search bar is present on a majority of our website pages






# Data Catalogue: Initial search results

Data catalogue search found 1550 related studies and 8 series in our data collection






# Data Catalogue: Refining your search results

Filters include topic, data type, country, date, and access conditions






# Finding Data: Variable and question bank

I have used the search term 'solar power'.


Search returned 19 results that mention the search term in the question or response.




## Finding Data: QualiBank



#### Useful resources: Get Data. Thesauri. HASSET

- Each data collection has keyword terms associated with it that come from the Humanities and Social Science Electronic Thesaurus (HASSET)
- Use the 'keywords' section from the Catalogue record to identify terms of interest and use related terms to expand or narrow your search. Here are the keywords for Credit, Class and Community: Working Class Belfast, 1930-2000 (SN 4993)



#### **Abstract**

The Understanding Society study, or the United Kingdom Household Longitudinal Study (UKHLS), which began in 2009, is conducted by the Institute for Social and Economic Research (ISER), at the University of Essex. As a multi-topic household survey, the purpose of Understanding Society is to understand social and economic change in Britain at the household and individual levels. It is anticipated that over time the study will permit examination of short- and long-term effects of social and economic change, including policy interventions, on the general wellbeing of the UK population. The Understanding Society study is a successor to the British Household Panel Survey (BHPS). The BHPS sample forms part of Understanding Society from Wave 2 onwards.

- Abstract Provides information about the focus of the survey and other details which will aid researchers
- Changes from the previous deposited versions
- Variables only available in a Secure Access version of these data
- Topics covered in the dataset
- Coverage, Universe, Methodology Spatial units, observation units, cases, methodology
- Citation and copyright provides a full data citation to be included when presenting data




# How to access data: Register

- Projects are an important part of accessing data; they help researchers to organise their work by a particular research question, it enables us to track how the UK Data Service is being used, and allows data owners to monitor how frequently datasets are used.
- Log in by clicking on 'Register / Login'. You will be able to use your university credentials to do so.

The 'Access' tab provides information on how data can be accessed. For Open Access data you will be able to download the data from this tab. If the data are End User Licence you will have the option to add them to project.




#### How to access data: Online tools - Nesstar

A number of our key studies can be accessed online through our Nesstar service.


Basic analysis and visualisations can be performed without downloading the data, or using statistical software.

On the "Access" tab - the option to "Access online" OR "Get Data" – "Explore online" and choose Nesstar.

#### How to access data: Online tools – UKDS.Stat

- International macrodata can be accessed online using UKDS.Stat.
- These data are provided by a number of organisations such as the World Bank, OECD, and the United Nations.
- UKDS.Stat can be accessed by going to 'Get Data' – 'Explore online'.
- Allows the easy creation of time series data displayed as heatmaps and other visualisations.


International macrodata - .stat PM2.5 and emissions per capita


