Shifts in data collection methodology

The three basic methods of data collection are:

- **The traditional census**, typically exemplified by the collection of data directly from respondents in the field by enumerators and/or through electronic/online media
- The register-based census, in which all information is collected from several independent administrative registers and then linked to create a single statistical database
- **The combined approach**, in which elements of both the traditional and register-based approaches are combined to suit national circumstances





Since the 2000 round of international censuses, the methodology for collecting census data has changed dramatically in many countries in the UNECE region.

The basic methods - the traditional census

The traditional (of full field enumeration) approach comprises a complex operation of actively collecting information from individuals and households on a range of topics, throughout the whole or specified part, of the country, at a specified time.

There are two major methods of enumeration:

- where the information is recorded directly by an enumerator during a doorstep interview with the respondent; or
- where the household members complete the questionnaire on their own and return it either to the enumerator, or via a postal service, or online.

The basic methods - the traditional census

Necessary conditions

- Good address list
- High level of literacy for self-completion

Advantages

- Comprehensive coverage (universality)
- All the data are collected at the same time (simultaneity)
- Short enumeration period
- A good understanding of the methodology
- Greater flexibility in deciding the topics to be covered
- Provides a base for subsequent sampling frames.

Disadvantages

- Administrative complexity
- High costs
- Declining responses
- Long periodicity
- Quickly out of date
- Hard to count some groups





The basic methods - the register-based census

In this basic approach there is no field enumeration element at all, and the data is taken by the statistical office solely from information held on administrative registers, usually under the control of other government departments or agencies.

The basic methods - the register-based census

Necessary conditions

- Legal authority in place
- Unique identification
- Population register
- Common definitions and concepts
- Public acceptance
- Good dialogue between NSI and data holders

Advantages

- Reduced costs
- Greater frequency of data
- No public burden

Disadvantages

- Data collected for non-statistical purposes
- · Updating may not be regular
- Reduced flexibility

The basic methods - the combined approach

The combined methodology makes use of registers relevant to a census, complemented by surveys and/or a complete enumeration. The use of survey/enumeration data is intended to:

- Improve the accuracy of the population counts;
- Provide information for census variables that cannot be reliably based on administrative data:
- Check, update and improve the quality of census data derived from administrative sources;
- Add additional variables to the census as and when demanded; and
- Provide a linking frame in order to bring together different sources.

The basic methods - the combined approach

Necessary conditions

- All necessary census information is available from one or other of the sources
- Ability to link the information from the different sources at the record level.
- Ability to link between persons and their dwellings

Advantages

- Population counts in this approach may be more accurate
- Maximum geographical and statistical detail
- Less costly
- Reduces respondent burden
- Less risk of non-response

Disadvantages

- More costly than register-based census
- Public awareness may be reduced
- More data processing required
- Poor coherence between the different
- data sources

Topics: Criteria for inclusion in the Census

- Must meet a significant and clearly demonstrated user need
- Information is required for small geographic areas and/or small population sub-groups
- Practicable questions can be devised
- Requirement to undertake multivariate analysis
- No adverse effect on public response
- Do not require lengthy explanation or instruction
- Statistical requirement only
- Acceptable burden on the public
- Core topics
- Non-core topics
- Derived topics
- Other topics
